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An illegal action that can be punished.

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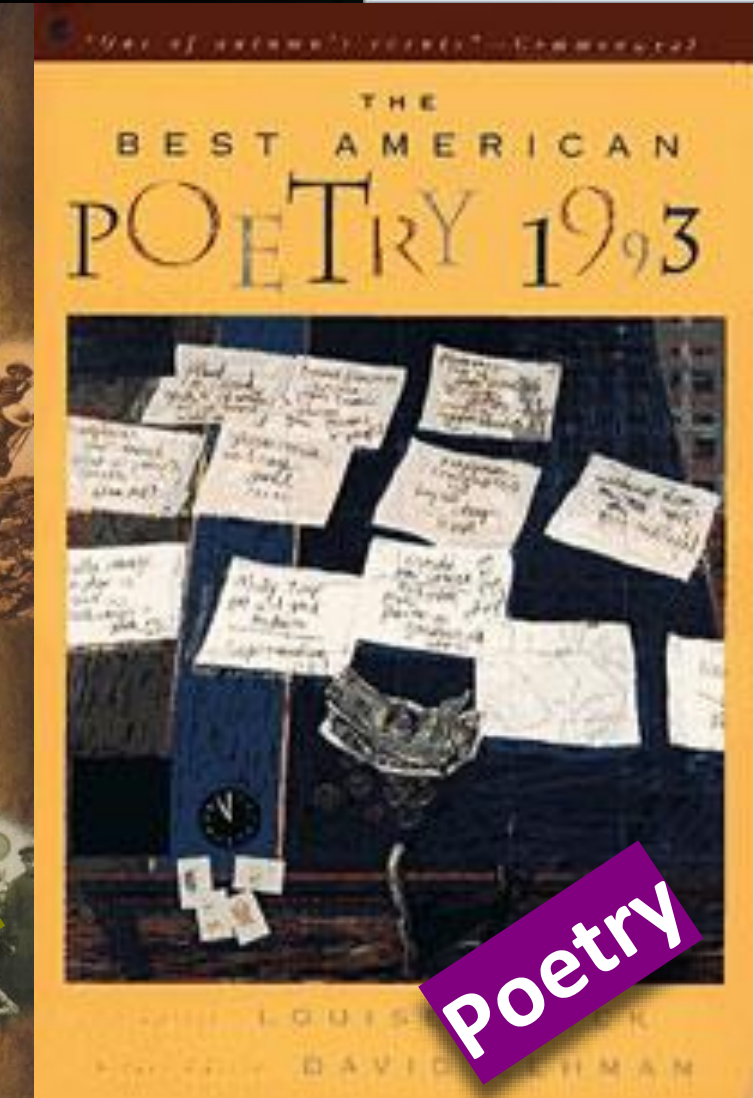
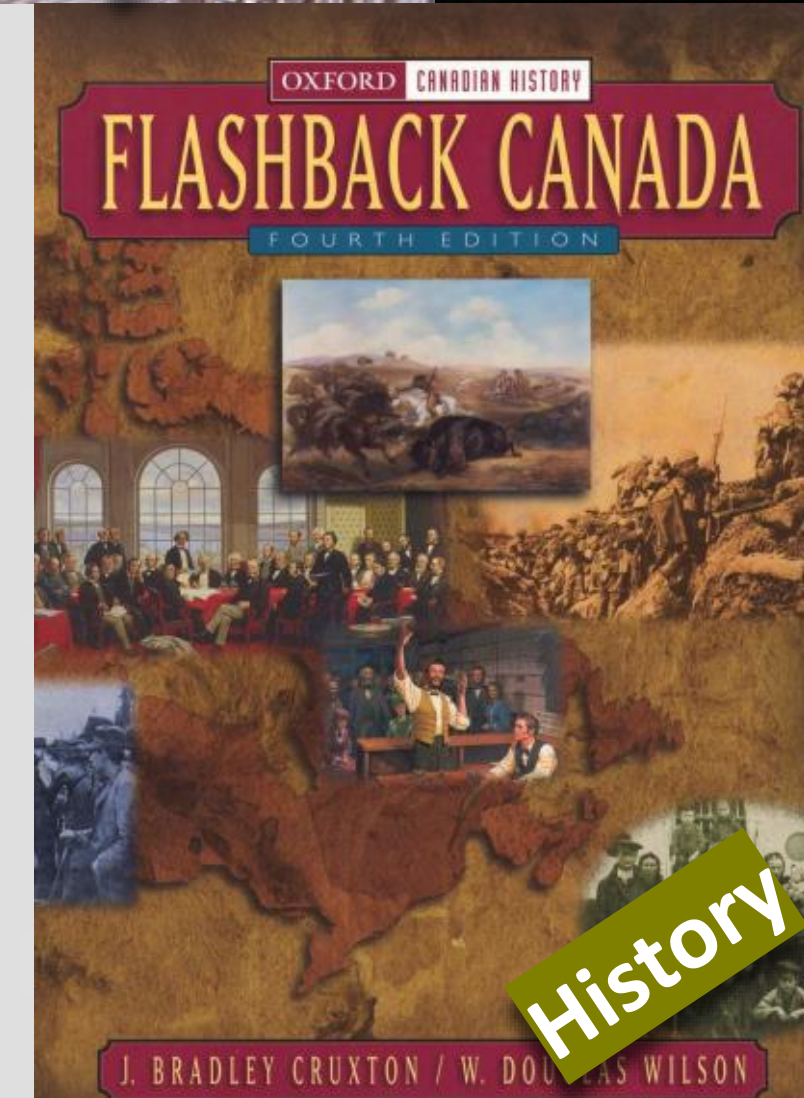
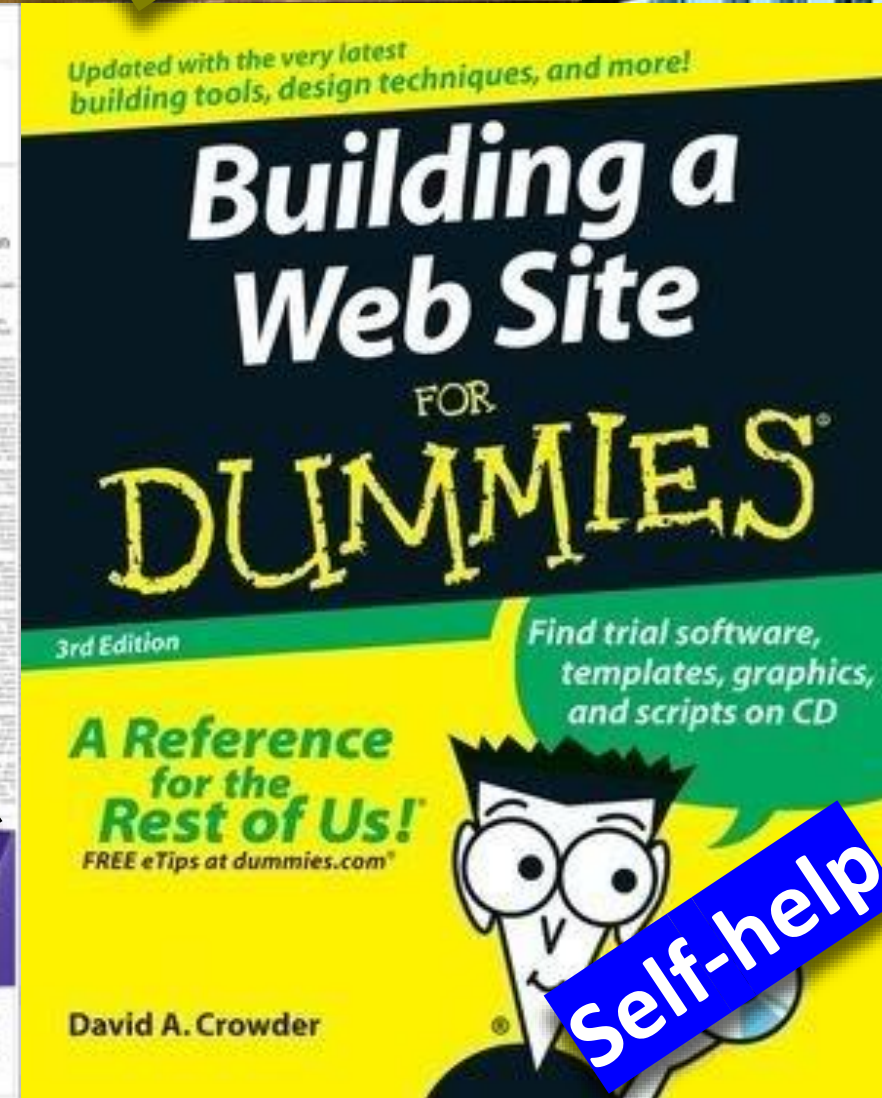
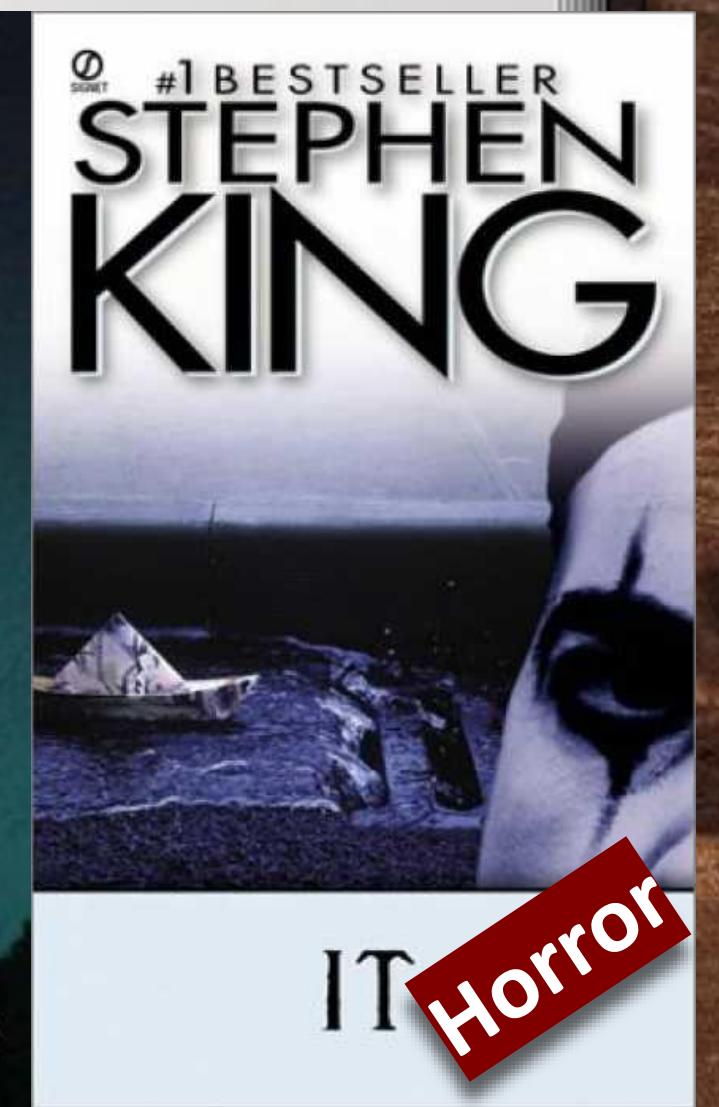
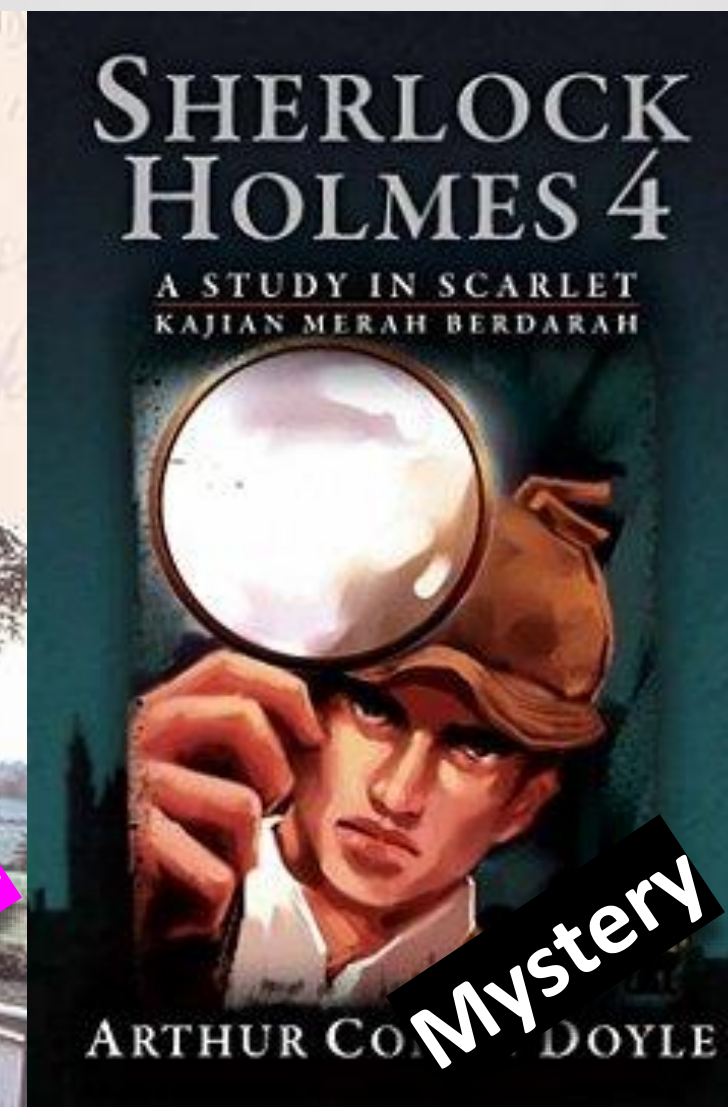
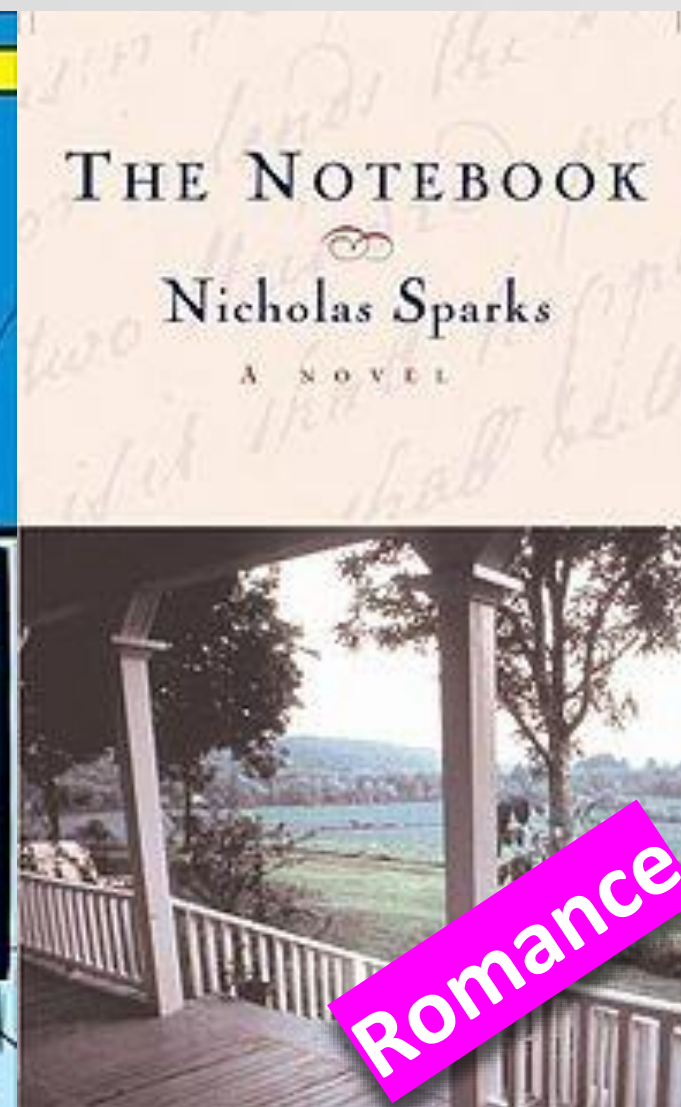
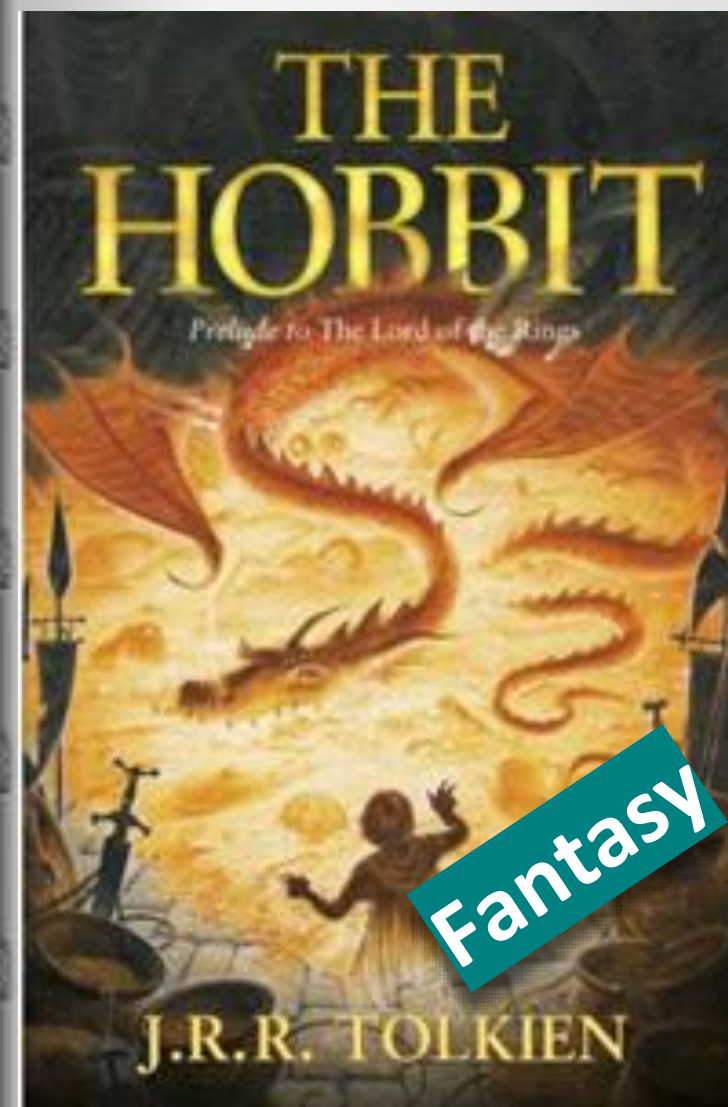
## **Alibi (noun)**

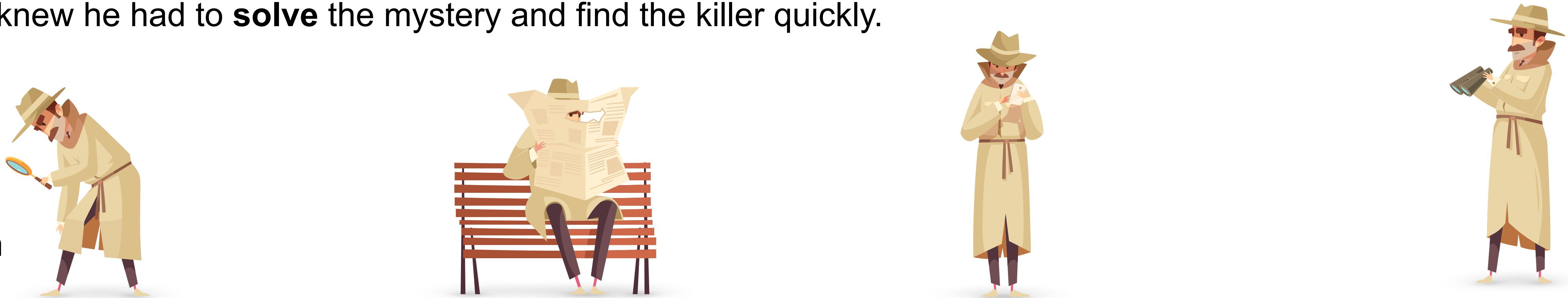

I'm sure one of the neighbours must have seen me.

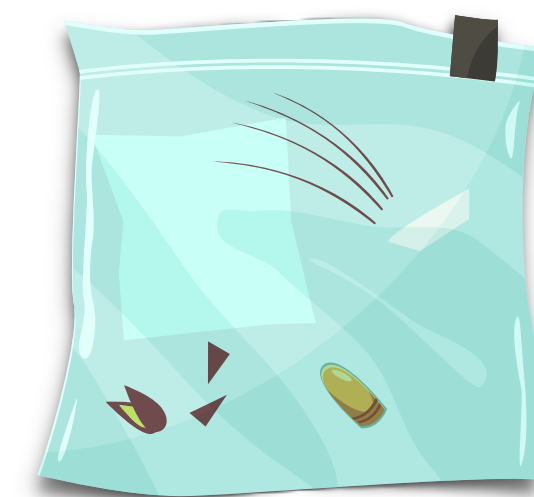
